RESILIENCY: How Safe, How Soon Project

- One year project (2008-09) focused on the premise that in the short term, increased resiliency will only come from community identified solutions and protection efforts.
- Focal Points: storm-water management, emergency preparedness, community engagement
- Project supported three distinct communities: Carrollton/ Hollygrove; United Houma Nation, and the Holy Cross/ Lower 9th Ward

Community Mental Health Project

- 3 outreach workers (Cynthia Carriere, Angie Kirkland, Mary Lockett)
- Connect with residents who are dealing with depression, anxiety, etc.
- Refer the residents to counselors and other professionals for treatment
- Funding for project comes from Red Cross and Robert Wood Johnson Foundation
- Served over 1,000 Lower 9th residents










